

Music development plan summary: Lincroft Academy

This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our students across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help students and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our students' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that students can achieve.

Students at KS3 (Year 7 and 8) have a one-hour lesson of music per week. KS4 students (Years 9, 10 and 11) receive 5 one-hour lessons per fortnight, following the OCR syllabus, as per the entire Meridian Trust.

The KS3 curriculum is mostly informed by the Model Music Curriculum. It is ambitious and knowledge rich and aims to provide all students with the skills needed to succeed in a music qualification at KS4, even if they do not access peripatetic lessons.

Through a topic-based curriculum, in KS3 music lessons students learn to play and develop piano skills and the ukulele. They are also taught the basics of African drumming and look at Reggae and music from the Caribbean. They are introduced to the concept of composing in Year 7 and develop this in Year 8. Students are encouraged to listen to and appraise a wide variety of musical styles and genres and sing in every lesson. Students perform, appraise, and develop their ability to engage in conversations about



music using high level musical vocabulary that can be used orally and written. Students will learn to decipher musical notation and have multiple opportunities to perform their own and others' work both independently and in an ensemble.

At Lincroft Academy, children with SEND are supported to achieve in all subjects. In music, all students follow the same curriculum with adaptations as necessary. Students who mainly spend their time in the ARC (Lincroft's specialist Autism Resource Centre) will access mainstream (music) lessons when they are able. The music teacher works with the SEN team who support these students, and others with SEND, to ensure that they access as many of the learning opportunities as possible.

Learning to read musical notation can be difficult for all students, and particularly those with dyslexia. All students have access to scaffolds, including labelled keyboard diagrams to help with note finding. Students also have access to both scaffolds and music on a range of coloured paper, should they need it. Acronyms are used to help all students remember the letters of notes (FACE in the space, Every Green Bus Drives Fast).

Some students with physical disabilities may find practical tasks a particular challenge. In these cases, the tasks are adapted for the child based on their individual need, with careful consideration regarding the purpose of the task, ensuring the challenge and key learning aspects can still be achieved.

Lincroft Academy works closely with teachers from Bedford Music Co-operative, who provide instrumental tuition for guitar, strings, woodwind, piano and brass. Private teachers provide vocal and percussion tuition. All these teachers enter students for practical graded music exams when they are ready. We are also supported by, and work with, the Bedford Music Service.

Part B: Extra-curricular music

This is about opportunities for students to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how students can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

At Lincroft Academy, all students can attend a choir called Vocalise, a Ukulele group and a Keyboard Skills group. Students do not pay for this, and they are all open to everyone. It is intended to try to develop some kind of instrumental ensemble to cater for the handful of students who play orchestral instruments.

Students frequently use the Music room to rehearse their own student-led bands at lunch times. Due to the current lack of practice rooms, this is limited to one group per lunchtime.

Teachers from Bedford Music Co-operative provide one-to-one instrumental tuition for guitar, cello, bass, violin, flute, clarinet, piano, voice and percussion. Private teachers provide vocal and percussion tuition. Students in receipt of pupil premium funding receive a subsidy for all these lessons to enable equal opportunities for students from disadvantaged backgrounds.



Through Bedford Music Service, students can access a variety of different musical groups, such as Steel Pan Academy, Digital Beats DJ-ing skills, Vocal Beats, Creative Beats and Rock School. In addition to these, there are the more traditional strings, wind and jazz band, North Bedfordshire Youth Choir and North Bedfordshire Youth Orchestra.

A student currently in Year 11 is accessing GCSE Music teaching through Bedford Music Service, because their preferred choice of options didn't fit the school timetable. Lincroft is working closely with Bedford Music Hub, ensuring that the student is fully supported.

At the start of the spring term, rehearsals will start for the annual summer term production, which this year will be *Les Misérables*. The production is open to all students, regardless of previous experience.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

The current Curriculum Leader for Music has only been in post since the start of the summer term 2024. Plans are in place to raise the profile of music within the school and the wider community, starting this year.

Alongside the annual school production (which will be *Les Misérables* in June 2025), there will be a Winter Showcase and Spring Concert. The newly established Vocalise ensemble (open to all students in every year group) will be visiting care homes in the local area around Christmas time and we hope to introduce a Carol Service at the local church. It is hoped that we will be successful in gaining places to participate in a GCSE Music conference/concert in London in November and we have planned to take part in Voice in a Million in March, to help raise the profile of the enjoyment derived from singing, across the whole school cohort. The Bedfordshire Festival of Music, Speech and Drama will also give performers an opportunity to perform outside of school in a competition which is friendly and supportive, designed to give constructive feedback to improve performance technique.

Students will have the opportunity to perform at the start of assemblies and hopefully visit our local feeder schools. Tea-time recitals are also being planned to give all students who receive instrumental lessons but may not yet be ready to participate in an ensemble or take a grade, the opportunity to perform and build their confidence within their performance skills.

Trips to appropriate concerts, either locally or in London, will be organised for GCSE Music students to give them the opportunity to experience high class live music first hand. Trips to see musicals, both locally and in London are also planned in collaboration with the Drama and Dance teams within the Performing Arts faculty.

World Music Day is celebrated across the whole school with a house competition; next year it is hoped this will be a performance-based competition.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

A brand-new Music department is currently being built, hopefully to be finished early next academic year. Within this, there will be an IT suite which will be equipped with music software and hardware. This will enable the KS3 curriculum to be changed to include units of work in which students can use DAW to produce/sequence their own music in school, like they can already access at home or on their phones. At KS4, this will enable students who are interested in using DAW for their composition coursework to pursue this option and be able to use the technology appropriately in school where it can be monitored effectively.

The new music department will also have a suite of practice rooms. This will also enable a change of topics in the KS3 curriculum, as currently we have one music room in a temporary mobile, with no practice rooms or near-by break-out spaces. This has inevitably impacted on the choice of instruments used and tasks which can be completed. The new practice rooms will also enable more students to rehearse in small groups, before school, during lunchtime and after school, which will in turn lead to more performance opportunities to the wider school community.

It is very much hoped that an ensemble for the few instrumentalists will take off and encourage other students to take part. It is our ambition to increase the number of students who are accessing peripatetic lessons on orchestral instruments and extra-curricular ensembles.
