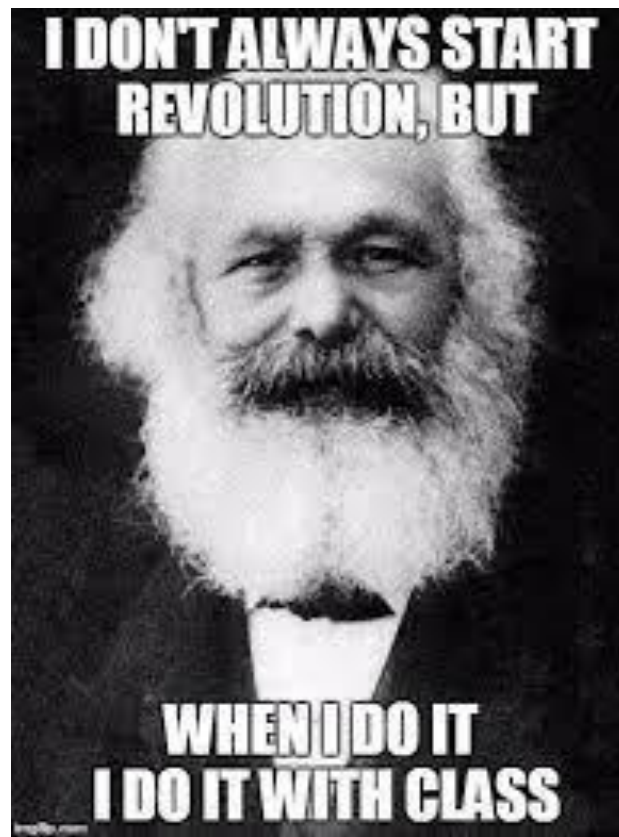


Sociology: the study of social life, social change and the social causes and consequences of human behaviour



You are required to complete **ALL** of the activities in this transition pack for submission in the first week of the new academic year. **The A Level in Sociology is a fun, embracing yet challenging qualification.** It will develop your thinking skills and vastly expand your knowledge of human behaviour. There will be 8-9 taught hours per fortnight. It is then expected that students do three hours per week of homework and independent study at home and during their approximately 10 weekly free periods.

This is a detailed and comprehensive assignment that you have been given. **Do not rush it.** We advise that you complete different parts of the transition pack at different points in the Summer holiday, rather than leaving it all until the final week of your break. **You should expect to spend longer on these tasks than any homework you have completed before.** A Level Sociology will be a significant step up from the work you have completed in Year 11... The 'A' stands for 'Advanced'!

Your A Level Sociology will be divided into three papers. Each paper will be two hours long. The content is below:

Task 1:

First it is important that you know what Sociology is and more importantly what it is not.

Complete the task below:

1a. In 50-100 words, summarise what you believe Sociology to be.

2a. Now watch the following video and add to your notes, summarising what you believe Sociology to be. <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=LK5J0-cM-HE>

At the Heart of Sociology are three questions:

What is happening in society? (*Social Research*)

Why is it happening? (*Social Theory*)

What can be done about it? (*Social Policy*)

It is important that you start to think like a sociologist – this is not just opinion but theory generated by research.

Within Sociology we will look at a number of theories and contemporary issues. It will be useful to you if you have already gained some knowledge on some of these theories/issues.

Task 2:

Consensus vs. Conflict Theory

Question: What is the difference between consensus and conflict theory's approaches to studying society? Make some notes on your answer to this question.



Task 3:

Action Vs Structure

Individuals are like moulded putty, squished and squashed by society and its structures, but there are decisions we make that are driven by internal motivations. Behaviour that comes from within us – decisions we make in order to do things - is called agency. **Agency** behaviour is meaningful and a reflection of self-will. Sometimes we can challenge and oppose structures, and in this way we help construct a part of our identity. The following link summarises these two approaches:

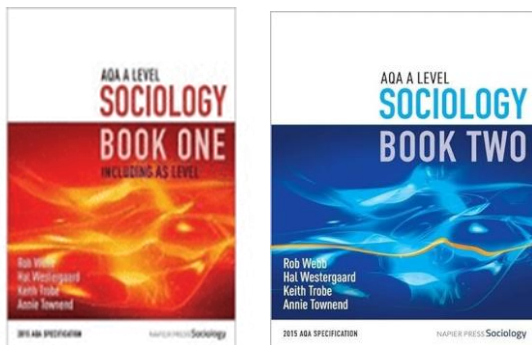
