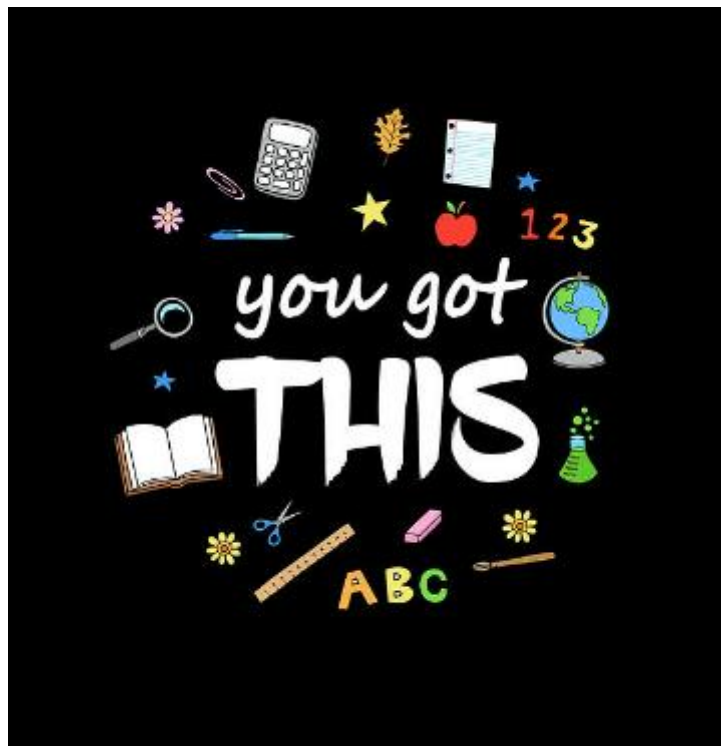

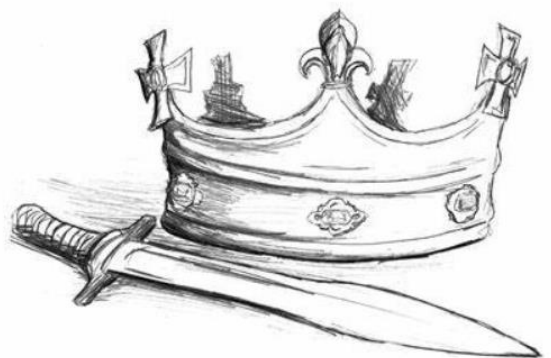

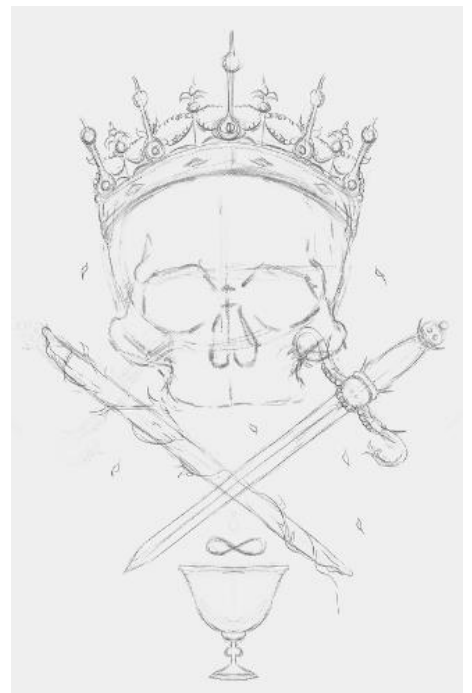

Voices

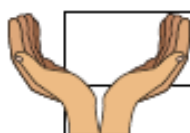
'His grating voice' (Scrooge)

'Outpouring, with a generous hand, its bright and harmless mirth' (Ghost of Christmas Present)

'Holding up his hands in a last prayer to have his fate reversed' (Scrooge)



Cold to warm

"Foggier yet, and colder. Piercing, searching, biting cold" (Stave 1)

"It was cold, bleak, biting weather" (Stave 1)

'The clerk, who, cold as he was, was warmer than Scrooge' (Stave 1)

"Sit ye down before the fire, my dear, and have a warm" (S4 Mrs Cratchit)

"Cold; cold, piping for the blood to dance to; Golden sunlight; Heavenly sky." (S5)
